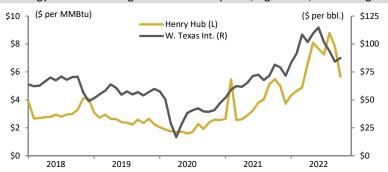

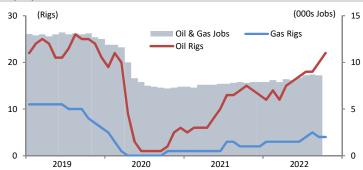

### ▶ Energy index: natural gas and crude oil prices, rig counts, and oil & gas employment. 1,3,8,11



▶ The Henry Hub natural gas price averaged \$5.67 per MMBtu in October, \$2.15 lower than a month ago. The WTI crude oil price increased 3.9% in October compared to the previous month and 7.4% compared to October 2021.



▶ Oil & gas jobs numbered 8,600 in September, an increase of 700 compared to a year ago. Average active oil rigs were 22 in October while the conventional gas rig count was 4. Note: Oil & gas jobs include both the NAICS 211 (oil and gas extraction) and NAICS 213 (support activities for mining) subsectors.

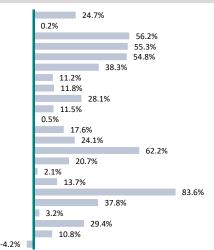

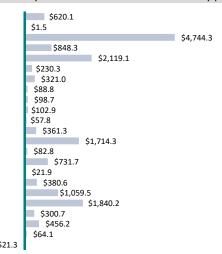

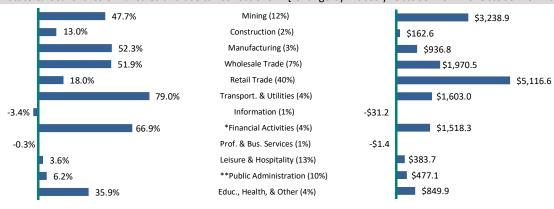

▶ In a year-over-year comparison (October 2022 vs. October 2021), sales and use tax collections statewide increased by \$16.2 million or 23.7%. 22 of the 23 counties saw year-over-year increases in collections. Campbell and Converse County saw the largest increases in collections, up \$4.7 million (+56.2%) and \$2.1 million (+54.8%), respectively. Both of these increases are mostly due to boosts in mining activity.

Note: Collections in October primarily reflect sales in September.

▶ In a year-over-year comparison (October 2022 vs. October 2021), the retail trade sector experienced the largest increase in collections, up \$5.1 million or 18.0%. The mining sector also saw significant year-over-year growth in collections, up \$3.2 million or 47.7%.

Note: Value in parentheses represents share of total collections.

\*Taxes are mostly from automotive, machinery, and equipment leasing and rental. \*\*Reflects taxes from automobile purchases.

Nonfarm wage and salary employment. [Change by Industry Sector: September 2022 vs. September 2021 by percent and jobs, seasonally adjusted]

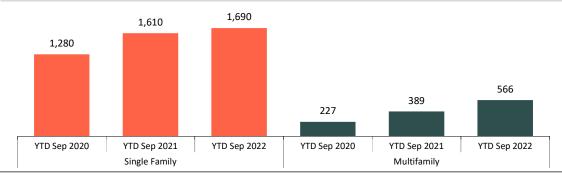


➤ Wyoming had 286,400 jobs in September, 8,200 more than a year ago, an increase of 2.9%. The leisure & hospitality industry saw the largest increase in employment, up 2,300 jobs (+6.4%) relative to last year. The mining industry saw the largest percent increase, up 7.9% year-over-year.

➤ Single family housing units permitted through the end of September 2022 increased by 80 (+5.0%) compared to 2021. The number of multifamily units increased by 177 (+45.5%) during the same period compared to 2021.



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
