



# ▶ Energy index: natural gas and crude oil prices, rig counts, and oil & gas employment. ¹,3,8,11



➤ The Opal Hub natural gas price averaged \$2.75 per MMBtu in May, \$1.15 higher than a year ago. The WTI crude oil price increased by 5.6% in May from the previous month and was up 128.2% compared to May 2020, when oil prices were low due to the Covid-19 pandemic.



>> Oil & gas jobs numbered 7,500 in April, a decrease of 2,500 when compared to a year ago. Active oil rigs were 8 in May, while the conventional gas rig count was 1. Note: Oil & gas jobs includes both the NAICS 211 (oil and gas extraction) and NAICS 213 (support activities for mining) subsectors.



# Wyoming Insight

### ▶ State & local shares of 4% sales and use tax collections. [Change by County: May 2021 vs. May 2020 by percent and dollars (in thousands)]



▶ In a year-over-year comparison (May 2021 vs. May 2020), sales and use tax collections statewide increased by \$6.7 million or 13.7%. 18 of the 23 counties saw year-over-year increases in collections. Teton County experienced the largest percent increase compared to May 2020, up 69.8%. Carbon, Converse, and Weston County all experienced declines of more than 35%. May 2020 is when statewide collections were at its lowest point during the pandemic.

Note: Collections in May primarily reflect sales in April.


▶ In a year-over-year comparison (May 2021 vs. May 2020), the mining sector reported the largest decline in collections, down \$1.9 million or 29.3%. The leisure & hospitality and pubilic adminstration sectors saw the largest percent increases in collections, up 73.4% and 66.2%, respectively, compared to last year.

Note: Value in parentheses represents share of total collections.




➤ Wyoming had 275,100 jobs in April, 12,300 more compared to a year ago, an increase of 4.7%. The leisure & hospitality industry saw the largest increase in jobs, up 12,400 jobs (+49.8%) relative to last year. April 2020 is when leisure & hospitality employment was at its lowest during the pandemic. Mining employment experienced the largest decline, down 3,500 jobs (-19.3%) year-over-year.

### ▶ Residential building permits. 10 [Comparisons: Single family and multifamily units]



➤ Single family housing units permitted through the end of April 2021 increased by 251 compared to 2020. The number of multifamily units decreased by 35 during the same period compared to 2020.



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
