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1998 County Population Estimates

According to the U.S. Census Bureau's recently released population estimates, the 1998 population for Wyoming increased to 480,907 from 480,043, which was the revised figure for 1997. The estimated net migration numbers, after accounting for the natural change (births minus deaths), indicate that approximately 1,800 more persons left the state than moved in from 1997 to 1998. Nationally, the population was estimated at 270,298,524 in 1998, an increase of 1 percent from 1997.

Most counties in Wyoming realized population increases between 1997 and 1998. However, only Big Horn, Niobrara, and Teton counties showed strong growth rates of 2.5, 2.3, and 2.0 percent, respectively. Albany and Carbon counties suffered significant losses of over 1.0 percent, and Goshen, Natrona, and Weston counties experienced slight population declines over the same period (see page 2 and 3).

1995 County Income and Poverty Estimates

Wyoming's median household income in 1995 was \$30,673, an increase of 5.9 percent from the level measured for 1993. The total number of poor persons statewide in 1995, at 55,171, declined 2.8 percent from 1993's level. The number of poor people as a percent of the total state population decreased from 11.9 in 1993 to 11.5 percent in 1995. The number of related poor school-age children (age 5-17) in families totaled 12,772, while the poverty rate for this category was 12.5 percent in 1995.

The poverty rates for all persons in 1995 decreased from the 1993 level in 15 counties, with the most significant drop realized in Campbell, Johnson, and Laramie counties. School-age children poverty rates in Johnson county declined notably from 14.4% to 12.5%. All counties showed increases in median household income from 1993 to 1995, with both Teton and Fremont demonstrating over 11 percent expansion.

The average poverty threshold for a family of four in 1995 was \$15,569 in annual income,

compared to \$14,765 in 1993. In addition to the official estimates of income and poverty by county, the U.S. Census Bureau also released estimates of related school-age children in families in poverty by school districts for the 1995-1996 school year (see page 4 and 5).

United States Census 2000

Census 2000, the 22nd decennial census of the United States, is only one year away. This monumental task will be the largest peacetime mobilization in our nation's history. About 300,000 workers will be needed to reach an anticipated 275 million people across the country, and we are all needed to make it a success.

Census 2000 will be the information cornerstone for the next century. Billions of federal, state, and local dollars will be spent on hundreds of projects across our nation. How and where that money is spent depends on census numbers. For example, decisions about education, health care, job training and businesses are based on information about children, the elderly, and unemployed. Moreover, the development of public transportation systems and traffic control are based on where people work and live. Census 2000 is your chance to make sure that the new century begins with an accurate and complete demographic and economic picture of your community.

The stake is high for Wyoming regarding the result of Census 2000. According to U.S. Census Bureau, over 10,000 individuals in Wyoming were not counted in the 1990 decennial census (see page 7). Based on the estimate from U.S. General Accounting Office, this undercount resulted in a loss of at least \$10 million of federal funds over the 10-year period for the state. For local governments, we estimated that the average city or county will lose about \$190/year in sales and use taxes, and additional millions of mineral royalties and severance taxes, and fuel taxes for each person not counted, because these funds are distributed by the state based on census population.

We're looking for people who want to schedule census jobs around their current employment, as well as retirees, participants in government programs, and people who are not currently employed.

Here's What You Can Do To Help:

- Advertise our jobs in your newsletters, post a notice on the bulletin board.
- Set up census recruiting desks in neighborhood meeting places.
- Help us find space where we can test applicants.
- Pre-train prospective applicants so they can fill out our application and pass our test.

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Questions And Answers About Census 2000 Jobs

What Are The Qualifications?

Applicants should be 18 years old or older and U.S. citizens (exceptions are made only if a qualified U.S. citizen cannot be found). They should not have had a conviction other than a minor traffic violation since age 18. And they should not be currently employed as a tax collector/assessor or law enforcement official. Men born after 12/31/59 must be registered with selective service. Additionally, applicants must take a written test of basic skills and pass a security and employment reference check.

Where Is The Work? What Are The Hours?

We strive to have people work within the neighborhoods in which they live. We need a representative work force, reflective of the community. Census taking is NOT an office job. Workers spend most of their time locating addresses and conducting door-to-door interviews. In order to find people at home, census takers **must** work evenings and weekends.

When Will The Work Begin?

Most census takers will work from mid-April to mid-June in the year 2000, to follow up on households that did not return their census questionnaire. In rural areas, people will be needed from August 1998 to January 1999 and March 2000 to update address listings.

How Much Is The Pay?

Census workers are paid weekly. They receive a competitive hourly wage, based on the average wage for the area and activity (approximately \$6.25 to \$14.00 per hour). They are paid to attend training and reimbursed for mileage costs. They get bonuses for exceeding production and quality standards and completing certain jobs.

What About Benefits?

Census takers are **not eligible** for coverage under Federal Employees Health Benefits Program, Federal Employees Group Life Insurance Program, and the Federal Employees Retirement System. Day care is not provided. Leave is not earned. Census takers are eligible for benefits under the Federal Employees Compensation Act for disability due to injury sustained while in performance of duty. They also are eligible for unemployment compensation under the unemployment for Federal Employees Program.

Who should apply for Census 2000 jobs?

Successful census takers are outgoing—not afraid to contact people and ask them questions and not discouraged by rejection.

They are organized and able to complete assignments on or ahead of schedule, working independently and following procedures.

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
