2003 County Population Estimates

According to the U.S. Census Bureau's recently released population estimates, the July 2003 population for Wyoming increased to 501,242 from 498,830 in 2002. The estimated net migration numbers, after accounting for the natural change (births minus deaths), indicated that only about 288 more persons moved in than left the state during the year. Nationally, the population was estimated at 290.8 million in 2003, an increase of 1.0 percent from the previous year.

About half of the counties in Wyoming showed population increases. However, only Johnson, Lincoln, and Sublette counties lead the state with strong growth rates of around 2.0 percent due to the natural gas activities in those regions. Niobrara and Platte counties each suffered losses of at least 1.4 percent during the same period, mainly caused by outmigration (see page 2).

2002 Employment and Per Capita Income

According to the estimates recently released by the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis, the number of full-time and part-time jobs increased 1.7 percent for Wyoming, from 333,573 in 2001 to 339,121 in 2002. The growth rate for the nation was only 0.1 percent over the same period. Both Johnson and Sublette counties showed the most substantial increase of about 5 percent each. Wyoming's per capita income (PCI) for 2002 was \$31,021, an increase of 2.7 percent from 2001. The overall national PCI was \$30,906 in 2002, up 1.2 percent from a year ago level. Per capita personal income is the annual Total Personal Income (TPI) of residents divided by population. TPI is the sum of net earnings by place of residence, rental income, personal dividend income, and transfer payments.

Teton County had the highest PCI in the state, at \$71,457; while Big Horn recorded the lowest figure of \$22,847 in 2002. Albany, Laramie, and Uinta counties exhibited the most significant growth of over 4 percent, respectively, from 2001 to 2002 (see page 3). Migration Flow for Wyoming

Recently released by the U.S. Internal Revenue

Service, these migration data provide measures of population movement from state to state by using the number of individual income tax returns in 2002 and 2003, combined with number of personal exemptions claimed on these returns. Therefore, the data only represent those persons who filed tax returns, but still cover over 90 percent of the population nationwide.

The IRS numbers show that the state which had the most population exchange with Wyoming was Colorado. In-migration to Wyoming from Colorado (2,982) covered 13.9 percent of the total in-migrants, and out-migration to Colorado from Wyoming (3,271) was 15.3 percent of the total out-migrants between 2002 and 2003. Other states exhibiting significant migration exchange with Wyoming were large states such as California and Texas, and neighboring states.

The state experienced net outmigration of over 100 persons between 2002 and 2003. largest net in-migration (in-flow minus out-flow) to the state come from California, Colorado, Nevada, Kansas, and North Dakota where at least 100 persons were lost to Wyoming, respectively. The main net out-migration went to Arizona, Idaho, and Montana which gained over 200 residents each from Wyoming (see page 4).

Residential Building Permits for Wyoming

The new residential housing units authorized for construction in the state was 2,877 in 2003. This was an increase of 832 units or 40.7 percent from previous year, the highest increase since 1992 due to the historical low interest rates. Laramie county recorded the highest number of permits in 2003 with 779 units, while Albany, Sheridan and Teton counties had nearly 300 new units added, respectively. Many rural and small counties, such as Goshen, Hot Springs, Niobrara, and Weston, continued to experience few new housings (see page 5).

Household Income, Poverty, Health Insurance

The real median household income for the 2-year moving average of 2002-2003 period was \$41,614 in Wyoming and it ranked 32nd in the nation. Both the poverty rate of 9.4 percent and the health insurance coverage rate of 83.2 percent ranked 41st in the country, during the same period (see page 6).

* Number of Returns: includes records for individual income tax forms 1040, 1040A and 1040EZ. The foreign category also includes forms 1040NR, 1040PR, 1040VI and 1040SS processed through Cycle 39. Returns processed after late September are not included in the data.

The number of returns also exclude returns with filer and spouse of filer deceased (and there are no other exemptions on the return); returns that do not match Year-1 to Year-2 and matched returns that are not geographically coded in either year, and "zero exemptions" returns are all excluded.

* Number of Exemptions: includes the filer (if not deceased), the number of children exemptions (at home, away, and with EIC), the number of parent's exemptions and the number of other exemptions.

* Matching Returns: tax returns are matched for two particular tax years (2003 and 2002). These are generically referred to as Year-1 (prior year) and Year-2 (current year). There are three categories of match status: (a) matched, (b) unmatched, Year-1 only, and (c) unmatched, Year-2 only. The match is made based on the SSN of the primary filer only. That is, no match is attempted on the secondary filer.

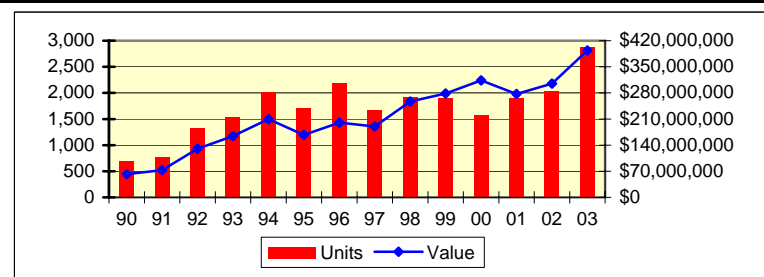
